RESOLUTION OF THE TOHONO O'ODHAM LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL (Opposing Federal Legislation that Promotes Construction of Border Wall, Waives Laws, and Undermines Tribal Jurisdiction)

RESOLUTION NO. 18-032

1	WHEREAS,	the Tohono O'odham and our ancestors have from time immemorial inhabited
2		lands from the Gila River area in present-day Arizona south to the Sea of Cortez
3		in northern Mexico and the Constitution of the Tohono O'odham Nation
4		provides, "It shall be the policy of the Tohono O'odham Nation to seek the return
5		to the Tohono O'odham Nation of lands and natural resources, including
6		minerals and water rights, within or adjacent to the Tohono O'odham Nation, or
7		which originally were a part of the historic Papagueria." (Constitution, Article
8		XVI, Section 9); and
9	WHEREAS,	in 1854 the United States created an international boundary with Mexico that
10		cuts through Tohono O'odham lands and that forms the 62-mile southern
11		boundary of the Tohono O'odham Nation's main reservation; and
12	WHEREAS,	the Nation's members are negatively impacted by illegal immigration and drug
13		trafficking across the international boundary, including increased criminal
14		activity, damage to the Nation's cultural resources, increased demands on tribal
15		law enforcement, illegal dumping, and environmental degradation; and
16	WHEREAS,	the Nation's members also suffer from dangerous on-reservation roads in the
17		border area that continue to deteriorate due to inadequate BIA funding for
18		repair and maintenance, and these roads and the Nation's natural resources are
19		further impacted from on-road and off-road use by United States Customs and
20		Border Protection and other law enforcement agencies; and
21	WHEREAS,	unlike national forests, wilderness areas, and other federal lands on the
22		international boundary dividing the United States and Mexico, the Nation's
23		reservation is not public federal land, it is reserved for the benefit of the Nation
24		and its members, and the Nation has a duty to ensure that tribal members'
25		rights and the Nation's sovereignty are protected; and
26	WHEREAS,	the Constitution of the Tohono O'odham Nation vests the Tohono O'odham
27		Legislative Council with the power to consult with the Congress and federal
28		agencies regarding federal activities that affect the Tohono O'odham Nation,
29		and federal agencies are required by Executive Order No. 13175, presidential
30		memorandums, and departmental and agency policies to consult and
31		collaborate with affected Indian tribes on federal policies and actions having a
32		substantial direct effect on tribes (Constitution, Article VI, Section 1(f) and (j));
33		and
34		

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1	WHEREAS,	the duty to protect Nation's lands and resources, and its sovereignty and
2		jurisdiction, including in the Nation's dealings with the United States Customs
3		and Border Protection ("CBP"), Immigration and Customs Enforcement ("ICE"),
4		and other agencies within the United States Department of Homeland Security
5		("DHS") operating on the Nation's boundary with Mexico, is consistent with the
6		DHS Tribal Consultation Policy in which, "The United States recognizes the right
7		of Federally-recognized Indian Tribes ("Indian Tribes") to self-government.
8		Indian Tribes exercise inherent sovereign powers over their members and
9		territories." DHS Tribal Consultation Policy, I.A.; and
10	WHEREAS,	H.R. 3548, the "Border Security for America Act of 2017," has been introduced in
11		the House of Representatives and would promote the construction of a border
12		wall on the Mexican border, waive or authorize waivers of numerous federal
13		environmental and archeological protection laws, authorize National Guard
14		deployments on federal lands, prohibit the Secretary of the Interior from
15		impeding, prohibiting or restricting the construction of a border wall, other
16		tactical infrastructure and technology, and would authorize CBP immediate
17		access to covered "Federal land" within 100 miles of the international land
18		borders of the United States; and
19	WHEREAS,	H.R. 3548 would also amend Section 102 of the Illegal Immigration Reform and
20		Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996 to broadly authorize the Secretary of
21		Homeland Security to "take such actions as may be necessary (including the
22		removal of obstacles to detection of illegal entrants) to construct, install, deploy,
23		operate, and maintain tactical infrastructure and technology in the vicinity of
24		the United States border to deter, impede, and detect illegal activity in high
25		traffic areas" and would amend the term "fence" to "physical barriers"; and
26	WHEREAS,	similar provisions appear in introduced bills H.R. 4760, S. 2192, and S. 1757; and
27	WHEREAS,	by Resolution No. 08-062 and other resolutions, the Nation has opposed the
28		waiver of federal, state and other laws under Section 102(c) of the Illegal
29		Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996 for the
30		construction of border fencing and roads as unnecessary, destructive, and in
31		violation of the federal obligation to consult with Indian tribes on a government
32		to government basis and to respect tribal sovereignty and self-determination;
33		and
34	WHEREAS,	while the Nation has supported border security enforcement measures,
35		including the construction of vehicle barriers, the maintenance of border fence

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1 roads, the construction and operation of two forward operating bases, the 2 authorization of pre-development activities for border surveillance 3 technologies, the establishment of Customs and Border Protection checkpoints 4 on reservation highways, and the expenditure of Nation's resources for border-5 related law enforcement measures, the Nation opposes the waiver of federal 6 environmental and archeological protection laws such as the National 7 Environmental Protection Act, Archeological Protection Act, Clean Air Act, 8 Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act and the construction of 9 a continuous border wall (Resolution No. 17-053); and 10 WHEREAS, H.R. 3548 includes certain provisions the Nation supports, such as permanently 11 authorizing the grant funding available through Operation Stonegarden, 12 providing funding for the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area Program, and 13 requiring DHS to ensure that CBP and Immigration and Customs Enforcement 14 officers are equipped with secure two-way communications devices, supported 15 by system interoperability with tribal law enforcement; and 16 WHEREAS, the Domestic Affairs and Appropriations Committees recommend reaffirming 17 the Nation's position on border security and immigration enforcement on the 18 Nation pursuant to Resolution No. 17-053 and opposing provisions in federal 19 legislation such as H.R. 3548, H.R. 4760, S. 2192, and S. 1757 that would authorize 20 the waiver of federal environmental and archeological protection laws for the 21 construction of a continuous border wall. 22 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council reaffirms 23 the Nation's positions in Resolution No. 17-053 "Border Security and 24 Immigration Enforcement on the Tohono O'odham Nation" and opposes 25 provisions in federal legislation such as H.R. 3548, H.R. 4760, S. 2192, and S. 1757 26 that would authorize the waiver of federal environmental and archeological protection laws for the construction of a continuous border wall and otherwise 27 28 undermine the Nation's jurisdiction over its lands and resources. BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Nation's official representatives are 29 authorized to present the terms of this resolution and other resolutions and 30 31 positions previously approved by the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council to the federal government, state and local governments and other Indian tribes or 32 their departments, agencies, or political subdivisions, private persons and 33 34 organizations. 35
