## RESOLUTION OF THE TOHONO O'ODHAM LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL (Opposing Ratification of the Indigenous Law Bill and Supporting Adoption of the COCOPA Initiative)

RESOLUTION NO. <u>01-206</u>

1	WHEREAS,	the Tohono O'odham Nation ("Nation") is a sovereign government and a federally
2		recognized Indian nation that represents a people divided by the United States-
3		Mexico international border; and
4	WHEREAS,	the lands now divided by this border are the aboriginal homeland of the Tohono
5		O'odham, whose residency predates the existence of the United States of America or
6		the Republic of Mexico; and
7	WHEREAS,	as a people with one homeland in two countries, the Tohono O'odham Nation has a
8		special interest in the Mexican government's relations with Indigenous peoples, as
9		members of the Tohono O'odham Nation residing in the State of Sonora, Mexico are
10		subject to the same laws and policies that have resulted in the harsh treatment of the
11		Mayan and other Indigenous peoples throughout the Republic of Mexico; and
12	WHEREAS,	the Mexican government's denial of the fundamental Indigenous right to free
13		${\bf determination \ and \ autonomy \ within \ the \ framework \ of \ the \ Mexican \ State \ resulted \ in}$
14		$the formation of the {\it Zapatista}  National  Liberation  Army (EZLN)  in  1994  and  the  EZLN's  and  constant  and  constant  are also in a constant and a constant a constant and a constant a$

17	WHEREAS,	the Tohono O'odham Nation recognizes that the adoption of the San Andrés Accords
18		by the Mexican government and the EZLN in 1996 was a first step toward gaining
19		meaningful legal recognition and protection for all of Mexico's Indigenous peoples;
20		and
21	WHEREAS,	the  Commission  on  Concordance  and  Pacification  (COCOPA),  composed  of  members
22		of the Mexican Congress, did draft an initiative ("COCOPA Initiative") designed to
23		implement the 1996 San Andrés Accords that was signed by the Commission and the
24		EZLN on November 20, 1996; and

27	WHEREAS,	during that time, the Indigenous National Congress was established and has now
28		grown to represent the will of an ever increasing number of Indigenous peoples
29		across Mexico; and
30	WHEREAS,	in part as a result of this growing movement, President Vicente Fox introduced the

1		COCOPA Initiative to the Congress of Mexico on December 5, 2000; and
2	WHEREAS,	on March 9, 2001, the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council expressed its support for
3		the Mexican Indigenous rights movement by passing Resolution No. 01-123,
4		"Supporting Adoption of the COCOPA Initiative by the Mexican Congress in Order to
5		Recognize and Protect Mexico's Indigenous Peoples' Rights to Self Determination and
6		Self Governance"; and
7	WHEREAS,	an EZLN delegation subsequently traveled to Mexico City with numerous supporters
8		and members of the Indigenous National Congress to continue a dialog with the
9		$Congress \ of Mexico, with the \ Indigenous \ peoples \ of Mexico \ and \ with \ the \ ``civil society'', \ and $
10		the private citizens of Mexico, and to urge the COCOPA Initiative's adoption; and
11	WHEREAS,	while the EZLN delegation did meet with the Mexican Congress on March 28, 2001, one
12		month later the Congress adopted a so-called "Indigenous Law Bill" that fails to
13		${\bf recognize}\ or\ protect\ the\ In digenous\ rights\ previously\ acknowledged\ by\ the\ COCOPA;$
14		and
15	WHEREAS,	on April 29, 2001 the EZLN issued a statement that it "formally denounces this
16		constitutional amendment on Indigenous rights and culture. It does not keep the
17		spirit of the San Andrés Accords, disrespects the COCOPA Initiative, completely
18		ignores national and international demands for recognition of Indigenous rights and rights and rights and rights rig
19		culture, sabotages the incipient process of building a relationship between the
20		federal government and the EZLN, betrays the hopes for a negotiated solution to the
21		war in Chiapas, and reveals the total divorce of the political class from popular
22		demand."
23	WHEREAS,	the Indigenous Law Bill that was passed by the Congress of Mexico must first be
24		ratified by more than one-half the states of the Republic of Mexico before becoming
25		law.
26	NOW, THEF	REFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council that the

3	EZLN, the Indigenous National Congress, and Mexican Indigenous peoples' efforts to
4	finally gain recognition of their rights by the adoption of the COCOPA Initiative and
5	defeat of the Indigenous Law Bill that was passed by the Congress of Mexico.

7	of MAY, 2001 at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of 2,086.45 FOR; -0-AGAINST;
8 9	<u>79.05</u> NOT VOTING; and <u>[01]</u> ABSENT, pursuant to the powers vested in the Council by Section 1 (c)(2) & (f) of Article VI of the Constitution of the Tohono O'Odham Nation, adopted by the Tohono

11	Indian Affairs (Operations) on March 6, 1986, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48
12	Stat. 984).
