## RESOLUTION OF THE TOHONO O'ODHAM LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

(To Support Passage of Federal Legislation Clarifying That Tribal Governments Are Entitled to "Government" Status under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA) and Internal Revenue Code Pension and Benefit Laws)

RESOLUTION NO. 06-046

1	WHEREAS,	the Tohono O'odham Nation and its enterprises provide various benefit programs
2		designed to foster effective and efficient government operations through the
3		employment of highly-qualified individuals; and
4	WHEREAS,	government sector employers traditionally attract, recruit, and retain competent
5		and qualified individuals for employment by offering employee benefit plans which
6		must be competitive with employers in both the public and private sectors; and
7	WHEREAS,	both Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA) and the Internal Revenue
8		Code (hereafter the "federal benefit statutes") currently grant government sector
9		employers greater flexibility and reduced regulation, as compared to private sector
10		employers, in the design and maintenance of benefit programs; and
11	WHEREAS,	the federal benefit statutes contain government sector rules in part because
12		government sector employers do not receive the tax benefits and incentives provided
13		to private sector employers, and in part in order to coordinate federal regulation with
14		sovereignty; and
15	WHEREAS,	the Internal Revenue Service has previously approved the Nation's 401(k) plan under
16		the government sector rules; and
17	WHEREAS,	as a result of the Internal Revenue Service's and the Department of Labor's failure to
18		provide broad based guidance concerning the status of tribes as "governments"
19		under these rules, tribal governments across the country and tribal organizations
20		(including the Inter-Tribal Council of Arizona, NCAI, and USET) have urged the
21		passage of federal legislation designed to resolve this uncertainty in favor of tribal
22		government status; and
23	WHEREAS,	Senate Bill S 673 including provisions favorable to tribal governments was passed and
24		is now in conference committee; and
25	WHEREAS,	a letter was recently sent to the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee,
26		Congressman William Thomas, with more than 60 signatures from tribes and tribal
27		service providers across the country, urging his support.
28	NOW, THER	EFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council hereby affirms
29		its support in joining with tribes and tribal organizations across the country to enact

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1	federal legislation to clarify once and for all that tribal governments are
2	"governments" under the federal benefit statutes.
3	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council hereby recognizes and
4	shows its appreciation for the efforts of those Arizona Congressmen currently
5	supporting House Bill 331, including Congressmen J.D. Hayworth (lead sponsor), Rick
6	Renzi, Ed Pastor, and Raul Grijalva, and hereby urges the remaining members of the
7	United  States  Congress  and  Senate  to  cast  their  support  for  this  important  legislation.
8	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council hereby shows its
9	appreciation to those members of the Senate Finance Committee that lead the effort
10	to enact Senate Bill 673, Senator Gordon Smith (OR), Senator Jeff Bingaman (NM), and
11	Senator Kent Conrad (ND), and to those members of the Senate Committee on Health,
12	Education, Labor and Pensions, for their recent effort to include the tribal
13	government provisions in broader pension reform legislation, Senator Enzi (WY),
14	Senator Bingaman (NM), Senator Hatch (UT), and Senator Murray (WA).
15	BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council hereby urges Senators and
16	members of Congress to cast their support to this important legislation ensuring
17	equal treatment for tribal governments, and urging the IRS and DOL to honor tribal
18	government status until this matter can be finally resolved by Congress.

Day of JANUARY, 2006 at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of 2,273.4 FOR; -0-AGAINST; 167.4 NOT VOTING; and [04] ABSENT, pursuant to the powers vested in the Council by Section 1 (f) & (j) of Article VI of the Constitution of the Tohono O'Odham Nation, adopted by the Tohono O'Odham Nation on January 18, 1986; and approved by the Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary - Indian Affairs (Operations) on March 6, 1986, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
