10	WHEREAS, this Resolution has been presented and considered by the Legislative Council
11	Domestic Affairs Committee, which recommends its approval to the Tohono O'odham
12	Legislative Council.
13	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council supports
14	S.B.1273 as it pertains to the appropriation of \$50,000,000 and authorization to the
15	lease or purchase of a ground based radar system integrated with cameras for the
16	Southern Arizona border for border protection.
17	BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council hereby designates the
18	Nation's Vice Chairman, the Director of the Department of Public Safety, and the
19	Legislative Council Domestic Affairs Committee as the Nation's representatives vested
20	with the authority to (1) explore the Nation's participation in the ground based
21	integrated camera system along the Nation's 75 miles of international border and
22	report back to the Nation's Chairwoman and the Legislative Council, (2) express to the
23	Governor of Arizona that the Nation is interested in consulting and cooperating with
24	the State to implement the ground based integrated camera system on the Nation
25	under terms acceptable to both the Tohono O'odham Nation and the State of Arizona,
26	and (3) negotiate, with the assistance of legal counsel, an agreement between the
27	Nation and the State of Arizona to implement the Integrated Radar and Camera
28	System along the Nation's 75 miles of international border; provided that any such
29	agreement shall be subject to final approval by the Legislative Council.
