RESOLUTION OF THE TOHONO O'ODHAM LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

(Accepting Termination of the Tohono O'odham Farming Authority's Management Responsibility For Papago Farms and Transferring Management and Control to Chukut Kuk District)

RESOLUTION NO. 06-486

1 V	WHEREAS,	according to Resolution No. 72-79 (August 31, 1979) of the Tohono O'odham Legislative
2		Council (formerly known as the Papago Council) ("1979 Resolution"), in 1979, the
3		Tohono O'odham Nation ("Nation"), was developing agricultural resources and
4		operating farms within the Nation's Reservation; and
5 V	WHEREAS,	pursuant to the 1979 Resolution, the Nation's Legislative Council created the Papago
6		Farming Authority to carry on agricultural activities of the Nation within the
7		Reservation according to the Papago Farming Authority Plan of Operation; and
8 V	WHEREAS,	pursuant to the Resolution of the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council (Adopting
9		Restated Plan of Operation for the Tohono O'odham Farming Authority) No. 283-90
10		(August 15, 1990), the Nation's Legislative Council adopted amendments to the Papago
11		Farming Authority Plan of Operation, changed the name of the Papago Farming
12		Authority to the Tohono O'odham Farming Authority, and continued the Tohono
13		O'odham Farming Authority's responsibility for the management of the Nation's
14		agricultural resources; and
15 V	WHEREAS,	the Tohono O'odham Farming Authority ("TOFA") currently operates under the
16		Tohono O'odham Farming Authority Second Restated Plan of Operation ("Plan"); and
17 V	WHEREAS,	pursuant to the Plan, including, without limitation, sections 3.1.4 and 4.20.1, TOFA is
18		responsible for managing the Nation's agricultural resources, including Papago
19		Farms in the Chukut Kuk District of the Nation; and
20 V	WHEREAS,	the Plan empowers the TOFA Management Board ("Board") to direct the operations of
21		TOFA to accomplish the purposes set forth in the Plan, including the management and
22		operation of the Nation's agricultural resources; and
23 V	WHEREAS,	in 2003-2004, the Board undertook a study to determine the viability of continued
24		operations at Papago Farms; and
25 V	WHEREAS,	the feasibility study determined the following:
26		1. The average cost of water at Papago Farms is between \$130 and \$150 per acre foot;
27		2. The average cost of water at the San Lucy, Vaiva Vo, and Schuk Toak Farms, the
28		other Nation farms for which TOFA has management responsibility, is between \$0-
29		\$52 per acre foot of water, which is significantly less than the cost of water at

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1			Papago Farms;
2		3.	Because of its remote location, labor and transportation costs at Papago Farms
3			are higher than at other farms in Arizona;
4		4 .	Over the past five years, the price of Arizona commodity crops has decreased to
5			all-time lows;
6		5.	Papago Farm's high water, labor, and transportation costs result in production
7			costs for alfalfa that are four times as high as the cost of raising the same crop at
8			other farms in Arizona;
9		6.	High production costs and low commodity prices have combined to make it
10			impossible to continue operating Papago Farms without large financial losses
11			that can only be made up with revenue from other farms;
12		7.	In recent years, TOFA has lost \$327,000 annually in its alfalfa production at
13			Papago Farms;
14		8.	The quality of the soil at Papago Farms is poor because the soil contains high
15			levels of sodium;
16		9.	Because of its proximity to the Mexican border, Papago Farms is directly
17			impacted by illegal immigration and drug smuggling activities, making it
18			dangerous for TOFA employees living and working at the Farms and difficult for
19			TOFA to recruit and retain qualified workers;
20		10.	Other options, such as producing traditional and high value crops or undertaking
21			aquaculture and livestock programs at Papago Farms, are not economically
22			feasible;
23		11.	If TOFA were to terminate its farming activities at Papago Farms, it would save
24			approximately \$264,000 in its 2004 budget; and
25		12.	TOFA can use the existing labor and property currently committed to Papago
26			Farms to increase production at San Lucy, Vaiva Vo, and Schuk Toak Farms;
27			and
28	WHEREAS,	bas	ed on these findings and the feasibility study's conclusion that other options for
29		ma]	king Papago Farms profitable were not feasible, on March 25, 2004, the Board voted
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1		to terminate all farming activities at Papago Farms; and
2	WHEREAS,	the Board has determined that it is in the best interest of TOFA to relinquish all
3		authority over and rights, responsibilities, and obligations for Papago Farms,
4		including, without limitation, all rights, responsibilities, and obligations to manage
5		and conduct farming operations at Papago Farms and for real property located at
6		Papago Farms; and
7	WHEREAS,	in May 2005, pursuant to Resolution No. 05-233, the Tohono O'odham Legislative
8		Council delegated authority over TOFA to the Chairwoman of the Tohono O'odham
9		Nation, and pursuant to that authority the Chairwoman of the Nation suspended the
10		TOFA Management Board and assumed the powers of the Management Board; and
11	WHEREAS,	the Chairwoman of the Nation has also determined that it is in the best interest of
12		TOFA and the Nation for TOFA to relinquish its authority over and rights,
13		responsibilities, and obligations for Papago Farms; and
14	WHEREAS,	Exhibit A to this Resolution lists TOFA personal property (1) formerly located at Papago
15		Farms and transferred to San Lucy, Schuk Toak, or Vaiva Vo Farms or sold after the
16		Board terminated farming activities at Papago Farms or (2) that TOFA plans to transfer
17		from Papago Farms to San Lucy Farms after the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council
18		accepts the termination of all of TOFA's authority, rights, responsibilities, and
19		obligations with respect to Papago Farms; and
20	WHEREAS,	Exhibit B to this Resolution lists the TOFA property that will remain at Papago Farms
21		after the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council accepts the termination of all of TOFA's
22		authority, rights, responsibilities, and obligations with respect to Papago Farms; and
23	WHEREAS,	the Nation's Legislative Council has determined that it is in the best interest of the
24		Nation to accept the termination of TOFA's authority over and all rights,
25		responsibilities for Papago Farms; and
26	WHEREAS,	the Chukut Kuk District Council has requested that the Nation transfer management
27		and control of approximately 3,600 acres which is known as the Papago Farms back
28		to the Chukut Kuk District for communal pastures, gardens, or for public purposes
29		of any sort, or to be leased by the District in accordance with Article XVI of the Tohono
30		O'odham Nation Constitution, <i>(Per District Res. No. 2006-34)</i> ; and

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1	WHEREAS, the Chukut Kuk District requests that the Tohono O'odham Nation, the Tohono
2	O'odham Farming Authority and the Chukut Kuk District collaboratively continue to
3	ensure that all environmental concerns and impacts caused by any prior activity will
4	be addressed jointly in the best interest of the District and the Nation, <i>(Per District</i>
5	Res. No. 2006-34).
6	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council:
7	1. Accepts the termination of TOFA's authority over and all rights, responsibilities,
8	and obligations for Papago Farms, including, without limitation, all authority,
9	rights, responsibilities, and obligations relating to (1) the management of Papago
10	Farms, (2) the conduct of farming activities at Papago Farms, and (3) all real
11	property located at Papago Farms;
12	2. Approves TOFA's transfer or proposed transfer of personal property listed in
13	Exhibit A;
14	3. Authorizes TOFA to take any and all other actions required to terminate TOFA's
15	authority, rights, responsibilities, and obligations for Papago Farms; and
16	4. Agrees to transfer management and control of the approximately 3,600 acres
17	which is known as the Papago Farms to the Chukut Kuk District for communal
18	pastures, gardens, or for public purposes of any sort, or to be leased by the
19	District in accordance with Article XVI of the Tohono O'odham Nation
20	Constitution.
21	5. Agrees that the Tohono O'odham Nation, the Tohono O'odham Farming Authority,
22	and the Chukut Kuk District will collaboratively continue to ensure that all
23	environmental concerns and impacts caused by any prior activity be addressed
24	jointly in the best interest of the District and the Nation
25	The foregoing Resolution was passed by the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council on the <u>14^{TH.}</u> Day
26	of <u>IULY, 2006</u> at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of <u>2,247.0</u> FOR; <u>-0-</u> AGAINST;
27	<u>-0-NOT VOTING; and 193.8[08]</u> ABSENT, pursuant to the powers vested in the Council by Article VI, Section 1 (i)(2) and Article XVI, Section 5 of the Constitution of the Tohono O'Odham Nation,
28 29	adopted by the Tohono O'Odham Nation on January 18, 1986; and approved by the Acting Deputy
30	Assistant Secretary - Indian Affairs (Operations) on March 6, 1986, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act
31	of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
