WHEREAS,	the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council is vested with the power to "administer land
	$and  other  public  property, and  by  law,  ordinance  or  resolution \ldots to  manage,  protect, $
	preserve and regulate the use of property, wildlife, land, air and natural resources
	of the Tohono O'odham Nation" and the power to consult "appropriate federal
	agencies regarding federal activities that affect the Tohono O'odham Nation"
	(Constitution of the Tohono O'odham Nation, Article VI, Section $1(i)(2)$ and $1(j)$ ; and
WHEREAS,	pursuant to Resolution 04-95, the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council did support
	$\hbox{\it ``the USBP's border vehicle barrier and all weather road construction proposal along}$
	the entire International Boundary within the Nation's lands, and supports
	Congressional appropriation for the project, " subject to several conditions,
	including that "the design of the border vehicle barriers and the all-weather road
	is subject to the approval of the Nation";and
WHEREAS,	pursuant to Resolution 06-465, the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council did "reaffirm
	its support for the USBP's border vehicle barrier and all-weather road construction
	project along the International Boundary within the Nation's lands" and "approves
	the use of 1) Bollard-style, corral (rail-on-rail), and /or temporary (Normandy) fencing
	in the design and construction of the USBP's border vehicle barrier as appropriate
	depending upon factors including the location of washes, archaeological sites,
	mountainous areas and areas deemed biologically sensitive to the Nation, etc. and
	2) cable and/or barbed wire fencing to augment the vehicle barrier to prevent cattle
	rustling and keep undesirable livestock from entering the United States"; and
WHEREAS,	the Chukut Kuk District pursuant to Resolutions No. 2003-18 and No. 2003-57 and the
	Gu Vo District, pursuant to Resolution No. GV03-80, previously expressed their
	support for the border vehicle barrier and the all-weather road project as well as a
	preference for the "corral fence" or "rail-on-rail" design of the barrier; and

## **RESOLUTION NO. 07-056** (Approving National Historic Preservation Act Section 106 Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) Among The U.S. Customs and Border Protection, Bureau of Indian Affairs, The Tohono O'odham Nation and the State Historic Preservation Officer Regarding Mitigation for Adverse Affects To Cultural Resources Along the International Border on the Tohono O'odham Nation) Page 2 of 4 WHEREAS, the Chukut Kuk District pursuant to Resolution No. 2006-35 and the Gu Vo District pursuant to Resolution No. GV03-80 as amended by Resolution No. GV06-082 have expressed their support for the installation of a variety of barriers; and WHEREAS, the Tohono O'odham and their ancestors, the Archaic Period peoples and the Hohokam have inhabited Southern Arizona since time immemorial; and WHEREAS, the Tohono O'odham Nation recognizes the need to protect, preserve and manage cultural resources on its lands; and WHEREAS, the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council passed the Archaeological Resource Protection Ordinance (06-84) in 1984 for "the protection and preservation of archaeological resources historically associated with traditional or sacred values and beliefs important to the O'odham, and of the physical site, location or context in which archaeological resources are found" and directs in Section 3(c) that "the Chairman hereby designated as the official to receive notification of any archaeological permit applications or of any archaeological or environmental impact or activities required to be given to the Papago Tribe pursuant to Federal Acts or regulations promulgated pursuant thereto," and in Section 3(d) defines Federal Acts has including the "Act of October 15, 1966, as amended, the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966" (16 U.S.C. 470 a-t; 36 CFR Part 800); and WHEREAS, the U.S. Customs and Border Protection (USCBP) proposes to install permanent vehicle barriers along the International Border between the United States and Mexico, spanning the southern boundary of the Tohono O'odham Nation and that the USCBP has conducted cultural resource surveys of 650 acres that will be impacted by the project and have determined the Area of Potential Effect (APE) to include a 20foot wide corridor that is adjacent and parallel to the International Border for the installation of 50 miles of vehicle barriers, 70 miles of existing border road and 11 miles of existing access roads, 35 miles of primitive 2-track trails, 0.5 miles of

temporary construction vehicle turn around locations, and 0.2 miles of permanent

vehicle turn around locations; and

WHEREAS, USCBP has determined that the installation of the permanent vehicle barrier will have an adverse effect on ten historic properties eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) (SON C:2:47 (ASM), SON C:3:10 (ASM), SON C:7:14(ASM), SON C:8:24 (ASM), SON C:8:7 (ASM), SON C:8:33 (ASM), SON C:8:34 (ASM), AZ DD:6:26 (ASM), AZ DD:6:25 (ASM) and AZ DD:6:29 (ASM) and has consulted with the Tohono O'odham Nation and Arizona State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended (NHPA) (16 U.S.C. 470f et seq.) and its implementing regulations (36 C.F.R. Part 800); and

Property Treatment Plan (HPTP) was developed by Gulf South and Northland Research (archaeological contractors for the USCBP). The Tohono O'odham Nation has been provided with copies of the HPTP and this plan has been reviewed, edited and approved by the Cultural Affairs Office of the Tohono O'odham Nation; and WHEREAS, the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the Tohono O'odham Nation, USCBP, SHPO and the Bureau of Indian Affairs that authorizes the implementation of the HPTP has been reviewed, edited and approved by the Attorney General's Office of the Tohono O'odham Nation.

WHEREAS, in order to mitigate the adverse effect on these ten archaeological sites, an Historic

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council does hereby approve the Memorandum of Agreement the authorizes the implementation of the Historic Properties Treatment Plan to mitigate the adverse effect on ten archaeological sites (located within USCBP vehicle barrier fence construction project) pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act and authorizes the Chairwoman of the Tohono O'odham Nation to sign this MOA.

The foregoing Resolution was passed by the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council on the 16<sup>TH</sup>. Day of <u>JANUARY</u>, 2007 at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of <u>2,440.80</u> FOR; <u>-0-AGAINST</u>; <u>-0-NOT VOTING</u>; and <u>[02]</u>ABSENT, pursuant to the powers vested in the Council by Section 1 (<u>d)(2)&(3)</u> of Article VI of the Constitution of the Tohono O'Odham Nation, adopted by the Tohono O'Odham Nation on January 18, 1986; and approved by the Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary - Indian Affairs (Operations) on March 6, 1986, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
