RESOLUTION NO. 07-175

1	WHEREAS,	the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council is vested with the power to "administer land
2		and other public property, and by law, ordinance or resolutionto manage, protect,
3		preserve and regulate the use of property, wildlife, land, air and natural resources
4		of the Tohono O'odham Nation" and the power to consult "appropriate federal
5		agencies regarding federal activities that affect the Tohono O'odham Nation"
6		(Constitution of the Tohono O'odham Nation, Article VI, Section 1(i)(2) and 1(j); and
7	WHEREAS,	pursuant to Resolution 04-095, the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council did support
8		"the USBP's border vehicle barrier and all weather road construction proposal along
9		the entire International Boundary within the Nation's lands, and supports
10		Congressional appropriation for the project, " subject to several conditions,
11		including that " the design of the border vehicle barriers and the all- weather road
12		is subject to the approval of the Nation", and
13	WHEREAS,	pursuant to Resolution 06-465, the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council did "reaffirm
14		its support for the USBP's border vehicle barrier and all-weather road construction
15		project along the International Boundary within the Nation's lands" and "approves
16		the use of 1) Bollard-style, corral (rail-on-rail), and /or temporary (Normandy) fencing
17		in the design and construction of the USBP's border vehicle barrier as appropriate
18		pending upon factors including the location of washes, archaeological sites,
19		mountainous areas and areas deemed biologically sensitive to the Nation, etc. and
20		2) cable and/or barbed wire fencing to augment the vehicle barrier to prevent cattle
21		rustling and keep undesirable livestock from entering the United States;" and
22	WHEREAS,	the Chukut Kuk District pursuant to Resolutions No. 2003-18 and No 2003-57 and the
23		Gu Vo District, pursuant to Resolution No. GV03-80, previously expressed their
24		support for the border vehicle barrier and the all-weather road project as well as
25		preference for the "corral fence" or "rail-on-rail" design of the barrier; and
26	WHEREAS,	the Chukut Kuk District pursuant to Resolution No. 2006-35 and the Gu Vo District
27		pursuant to Resolution No. GV03-80 as amended by Resolution No. GV06-082 have
28		expressed their support for the installation of a variety of barriers; and

- 1WHEREAS, the Tohono O'odham and their ancestors, the Archaic Period peoples and the2Hohokam have inhabited Southern Arizona since time immemorial; and
- WHEREAS, the Tohono O'odham Nation recognizes the need to protect, preserve and manage
 cultural resources on its lands; and

WHEREAS, the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council passed the Archaeological Resource 5 Protection Ordinance (06-84) in 1984 for "the protection and preservation of 6 7 archaeological resources historically associated with traditional or sacred values and beliefs important to the O'odham, and of the physical site, location or context in 8 which archaeological resources are found" and directs in Section 3(c) that "the 9 10 Chairman is hereby designated as the official to receive notification of any archaeological permit applications or of any archaeological or environmental 11 12 impact or activities required to be given to the Papago Tribe pursuant to Federal Acts or regulations promulgated pursuant thereto," and in Section 3(d) defines Federal 13 Acts has including the "Act of October 15, 1966, as amended, the National Historic 14 15 Preservation Act of 1966" (16 U.S.C. 470 a-t; 36 CFR Part 800); and

16 WHEREAS. the U.S. Customs and Border Protection (USCBP) proposes to install permanent 17 vehicle barriers along the International Border between the United States and 18 Mexico, spanning the southern boundary of the Tohono O'odham Nation and that the 19 USCBP has conducted cultural resource surveys of 650 acres that will be impacted 20 by the project and have determined the Area of Potential Effect (APE) to include a 20-21 foot wide corridor that is adjacent and parallel to the International Border for the installation of 50 miles of vehicle barriers, 70 miles of existing border road and 11 22 23 miles of existing access roads, 35 miles of primitive 2-track trails, 0.5 miles of 24 temporary construction vehicle turn around locations, and 0.2 miles of permanent 25 vehicle turn around locations: and

WHEREAS, USCBP has determined that the installation of the permanent vehicle barrier will
 have an adverse effect on ten historic properties eligible for listing on the National
 Register of Historic Places (NRHP) (SON C:2:47 (ASM), SON C:3:10 (ASM), SON C:7:14
 (ASM), SON C:8:24 (ASM), SON C:8:7 (ASM), SON C:8:33 (ASM), SON C:8:34 (ASM), AZ
 DD:6:26 (ASM), AZ DD:6:25 (ASM) and AZ DD:6:29 (ASM) and has consulted with the

1 Tohono O'odham Nation and Arizona State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) 2 pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended 3 (NHPA) (16 U.S.C. 470f et seq.) and its implementing regulations (36 C.F.R. Part 800); 4 and 5 WHEREAS, in order to mitigate the adverse effect on these ten archaeological sites, an Historic 6 Property Treatment Plan (HPTP) was developed by Gulf South and Northlaud 7 Research (archaeological contractors for the USCBP). The Tobono O'odham Nation 8 has been provided with copies of the HPTP and this plan has been reviewed, edited 9 and approved by the Cultural Affairs Office of the Tohono O'odham Nation, USCBP, 11 SHPO and the Burean of Indian Affairs that anthorizes the implementation of the 12 HPTP has been reviewed, edited and approved by the Attorney General's Office of the 13 Tohno O'odham Nation; and 14 WHEREAS, the MOA was previously approved by the Legislative Council, pursuant to Resolution 15 No. 07-056, the MOA has since been modified, with agreement of all parties, by 16 deleting the sentence regarding the Secretary of Homeland Security's authority to 17 waive legal requirements to ensure expeditions construction of barriers and roads 18<		-
