RESOLUTION OF THE TOHONO O'ODHAM LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL (Enacting 4 Tohono O'odham Code Chapter 4 Violating a Public Health Measure)

RESOLUTION NO. 20-443

1	WHEREAS,	"[t]he sovereign powers, authority and jurisdiction of the Tohono O'odham
2		Nation and its government shall extend to all persons and activities carried on
3		within the boundaries of the Tohono O'odham Nation consistent with federal
4		law." (Constitution of the Tohono O'odham Nation, Article I, Section 2); and
5	WHEREAS,	the Legislative Council is vested with the power "to enact criminal and civil laws
6		governing the conduct of any person within the Tohono O'odham Nation" and to
7		provide laws "to promote, protect and provide for public health, peace, morals,
8		education and general welfare of the Tohono O'odham Nation and its members"
9		(Constitution of the Tohono O'odham Nation, Article VI, Section 1(c)(6) and
10		1(c)(2)); and
11	WHEREAS,	Indian tribes possess civil jurisdiction over non-members and non-Indians who
12		enter into consensual relationships with the Nation or its members and when
13		their presence or conduct in violating COVID-19 public health measures
14		threatens or has some direct effect on the political integrity, the economic
15		security, or the health and or welfare of the tribe (See Montana v. United States,
16		450 U.S. 544 (1981)); and
17	WHEREAS,	Indian tribes also possess the inherent right to exclude non-members from
18		tribally owned lands (<i>Merrion v. Jicarilla Apache Tribe</i> , 455 U.S. 130 (1982)); and
19	WHEREAS,	early in 2020, the outbreak of the novel coronavirus identified as COVID-19 in the
20		United States, including the State of Arizona, deeply impacted the health and
21		welfare of the Tohono O'odham Nation and its members, and threatened the
22		integrity of the Nation's government, the Nation's culture, and its economic
23		security; and
24	WHEREAS,	the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has determined that American
25		Indians/Alaskan Natives are four times more likely to be hospitalized and more
26		than two and a-half times more likely to die from COVID-19 than white, non-
27		Hispanic persons; and
28	WHEREAS,	on March 13, 2020, in response to the rapid spread of COVID-19 in the United
29		States, and confirmed presence in the State of Arizona, the Nation's Chairman
30		declared a State of Emergency for the Tohono O'odham Nation, and established
31		the Nation's Unified Command in order to coordinate necessary policies, and to
32		direct resources to the Nation in a timely manner; and

1	WHEREAS,	by Resolution No. 20-094, the Legislative Council authorized the Nation's
2		Chairman or Vice-Chairwoman or their official designee to prepare, mitigate,
3		prevent, respond, and recover from the COVID-19 pandemic by issuing executive
4	ľ	orders to restrict the movement of people, to prohibit meetings, and to require
5		compliance with public health orders and directives; and
6	WHEREAS,	in response to concerns raised by Nation's members about noncompliance with
7		and enforcement of COVID-19 emergency executive orders, the Domestic Affairs
8		Committee drafted and presented an amendment to the Nation's Criminal Code
9		Section 3.15 - Violating an Executive Order, which made violating certain
10		executive orders addressing disease outbreaks and other emergencies an offense
11		under the Nation's Criminal Code; and
12	WHEREAS,	since Criminal Code Section 3.15 was enacted, the number of daily new COVID-19
13		cases in Arizona have risen to the highest levels during the current crisis; and
14	WHEREAS,	in response to the evolving health crisis, in order to more effectively encourage
15		and support critical public health measures, and for other purposes, the
16		Domestic Affairs and Health and Human Services Committees recommend that
17		the Legislative Council repeal 7 Tohono O'odham Code Chapter 1 - Criminal Code,
18		Section 3.15 - Violating an Executive Order, and instead enact 4 Tohono O'odham
19		Code Chapter 4 - Violation of a Public Health Measure, as dated for reference
20		December 2020, as an additional tool for protecting public health and safety.
21	NOW, THERE	FORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council:
22		1. Repeals 7 Tohono O'odham Code Chapter 1 - Criminal Code, Section 3.15 -
23		Violating an Executive Order, on the effective date of this resolution; and
24		2. Enacts 4 Tohono O'odham Code Chapter 4 - Violating a Public Health
25		Measure, on the effective date of this resolution; provided that 4 Tohono

Measure, on the effective date of this resolution; provided that 4 Tohono O'odham Code Chapter 4 shall be repealed automatically on June 1, 2021 unless extended by Legislative Council resolution.
