RESOLUTION OF THE TOHONO O'ODHAM LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL (Requesting the Secretary of the Interior take into Trust 3,759.52 Acres of Land)

RESOLUTION NO. 21-159

1	WHEREAS,	Article~XVI, Section~9~of~the~Constitution~of~the~Tohono~O'odham~Nation~provides,
2		"It shall be the policy of the Tohono O'odham Nation to seek the return to the
3		Tohono O'odham Nation of lands within or adjacent to the Tohono O'odham
4		Nation, or which originally were a part of the historic Papagueria."; and
5	WHEREAS,	the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council is vested with the power to acquire and
6		administer land and to "consult with the Congress of the United States and
7		appropriate federal agencies regarding federal activities that affect the Tohono
8		O'odham Nation" (Constitution of the Tohono O'odham Nation, Article VI, Section
9		1(i) and 1(j)); and
10	WHEREAS,	San Lucy District is a political subdivision of the Tohono O'odham Nation and is
11		located on the Gila Bend Indian Reservation, adjacent to Gila Bend, Arizona; and
12	WHEREAS,	prior to the events that led up to the enactment of the Gila Bend Indian
13		Reservation Lands Replacement Act, Pub. L. 99-503, 100 Stat. 1798 (1986), the Gila
14		Bend Indian Reservation, a part of San Lucy District and the Tohono O'odham
15		Nation, encompassed a 10,297 acre land base; and
16	WHEREAS,	throughout the 1950s, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers designed and constructed
17	1	the Painted Rock Dam as a flood control project located ten miles downstream of
18		the existing Gila Bend Indian Reservation; and
19	WHEREAS,	in 1964, the United States obtained a court-ordered flowage easement giving it
20		the perpetual right to occasionally overflow, flood, and submerge 7,723.82 acres
21		of the Gila Bend Indian Reservation and all structures on the land, and to prohibit
22		the use of the land for human habitation; and
23	WHEREAS,	the same year, San Lucy District community members of the Tohono O'odham
24		Nation were relocated to the 40-acre San Lucy Village by act of Congress (P.L. 88-
25		462; 78 Stat. 559); and
26	WHEREAS,	Gila Bend Indian Reservation lands sustained flooding throughout the late 1970s
27		and early 1980s, destroying a 750-acre farm that was developed at tribal expense,
28		and rendering the remaining acreage unsuitable for economic development; and
29	WHEREAS,	under the Gila Bend Indian Reservation Lands Replacement Act, the United
30		States Congress found that, although an earlier public law authorized the
31		Secretary of the Interior "to exchange certain agricultural lands of the Gila Bend
32		Indian Reservation, Arizona, for public lands suitable for farming" that "[a]n
33		examination of public lands within a one hundred mile radius of the reservation
34		disclosed that those which might be suitable for agriculture would require

1		substantial Federal outlays for construction of irrigation system, roads,
2		education and health facilities." (Pub. L. 99-503, Section 2(1) and (2)); and
3	WHEREAS,	the Congress concluded that the "lack of an appropriate land base severely
4		retards the economic self-sufficiency of the O'odham people of the Gila Bend
5		Indian Reservation, contributes to their high unemployment and acute health
6		problems, and results in chronic high costs for Federal services and transfer
7		payments." (Pub. L. 99-503, Section 1(3)); and
8	WHEREAS,	the Congress therefore enacted the Gila Bend Indian Reservation Lands
9		Replacement Act to "facilitate replacement of reservation lands with lands
10		suitable for sustained economic use which is not principally farming and do not
11		require Federal outlays for construction, and promote the economic self-
12		sufficiency of the O'odham Indian people." (Pub. L. 99-503, Section 1(4)); and
13	WHEREAS,	the Tohono O'odham Nation is authorized to acquire replacement lands under
14		the terms of the Gila Bend Indian Reservation Lands Replacement Act, which
15		lands the Secretary of the Interior ``shall hold in trust for the benefit'' of the Nation
16		(Pub. L. 99-503, Section 6(d)); and
17	WHEREAS,	under the terms of the Gila Bend Indian Reservation Lands Replacement Act,
18		such trust lands shall be deemed an Indian reservation "for all purposes" (Pub. L.
19		99-503, Section 6(d)); and
20	WHEREAS,	by Resolution No. 02-579, the Tohono O'odham Nation requested that 3,766 acres
21		(the "Painted Rock property") be taken into trust by the United States for the
22		benefit of the Tohono O'odham Nation, to be used as replacement lands under the
23		terms of the Gila Bend Indian Reservation Lands Replacement Act, Pub. L. 99-503;
24		and
25	WHEREAS,	theDepartmentofInterior'sconsiderationofthelands-into-trustapplicationfor
26	8	the Painted Rock property was suspended at the Nation's request in 2009; and
27	WHEREAS,	the Nation intends to use the Painted Rock property, which has been surveyed to
28		include 3,759.52 acres, for the purposes designated in the Gila Bend Indian
29		Reservation Lands Replacement Act; and
30	WHEREAS,	the Nation, in consultation with the San Lucy District, finds that it is in the best
31		interest of the District and the Nation that the Painted Rock property application
32		be resubmitted and that the property be acquired by the Secretary of the Interior
33		in trust as a single area for the Nation in accordance with the Gila Bend Indian
34		Reservation Lands Replacement Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council requests that the Secretary of the Interior acquire the 3,759.52-acre Painted Rock property in trust status on behalf of the Tohono O'odham Nation in accordance with the Gila Bend Indian Reservation Lands Replacement Act. BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council authorizes the Nation's chairperson and other members of the Nation's Economic Development Delegation to take all necessary actions to carry out the intent of this resolution. The foregoing Resolution was passed by the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council on the 14TH day of MAY, 2021 at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of 2,961.9 FOR; -0-AGAINST; -0- NOT VOTING; and 213.8 [02] ABSENT, pursuant to the powers vested in the Council by Article VI, Section 1(i) and 1(j) and Article XVI, Section 9 of the Constitution of the Tohono O'odham Nation, adopted by the Tohono O'odham Nation on January 18, 1986; and approved by the Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary - Indian Affairs (Operations) on March 6, 1986, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
