RESOLUTION OF THE TOHONO O'ODHAM LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL (Granting a Right for a Utility Alignment to the Tohono O'odham Utility Authority for Project No. TU 20-861 – Chui-Chu to White Horse Pass Communities Water System Intertie)

RESOLUTION NO. 21-272

1	WHEREAS,	the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council is authorized "to manage, protect,
2		preserve and regulate" the use of Nation's property and "to manage or
3		otherwise deal with lands, or interests in land" belonging to the Nation
4		(Constitution of the Tohono O'odham Nation, Article VI, Section 1(i)(2) and Section
5		2(d)); and
6	WHEREAS,	by Resolution No. 91-175, the Legislative Council approved the Second Restated
7		Plan of Operation for the Tohono O'odham Utility Authority ("TOUA"), formerly
8		known as the Papago Tribal Utility Authority, to plan, provide and furnish utility
9		services to all areas within the Nation, to acquire, construct, operate, maintain,
10		promote and expand utility systems to furnish electric, gas, water, sewer and
11		telephone services within the Nation's lands; and
12	WHEREAS,	by Resolution No. 17-032, the Nation approved the Utility Alignment Recordation
13		Procedures for Tohono O'odham Utility Authority Projects, which provided the
14		process for TOUA to be granted a right to a utility alignment on the Nation, by the
15		Nation, without the approval of the Bureau of Indian Affairs ("BIA") and which was
16		authorized pursuant to 25 CFR §169.4(b)(3)(iii); and
17	WHEREAS,	TOUA has submitted a complete application to the Nation's Real Estate
18		Management Office for the approval and recordation of a utility alignment for
19		Project No. TU 20-861 – Chui-Chu to White Horse Pass Communities Water System
20		Intertie (the "Project"), as required under the Nation's Utility Alignment
21		Recordation Procedures; and
22	WHEREAS,	the Indian Health Service ("IHS") determined that arsenic and nitrate levels in the
23		two White Horse Pass Community wells are near the Maximum Contaminant
24		Level ("MCL") established by the Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA")
25		National Primary Drinking Water Regulation requirements; and
26	WHEREAS,	the White Horse Pass Community water system is not a public water system
27		required to meet public water system compliance, however, the Tohono O'odham
28		Nation strives to exceed national drinking water requirements for all its water
29		systems in order to safeguard each tribal member's health; and
30	WHEREAS,	IHS determined the best alternative for lowering the levels of arsenic and nitrate
31		found in the White Horse Pass Community's water system, is to connect the
32		community to the Chui-Chu Public Water System composed of four (4) wells that

1		are operated using a blending strategy that ensures water served to the public is
2		below the MCL; and
3	WHEREAS,	the Project was made possible through the United States Environmental
4		Protection Agency and provides funds for the purchase of an inline booster
5		station, 9,483 feet of 4" HPDE water main, a generator, SCADA (a computer
6		application used to remotely control and monitor the water system), and other
7		related costs; and
8	WHEREAS,	the new utility alignment is 50 feet wide and is 10,204.37 feet in length that will
9		run parallel to Indian Route 35 encompassing 11.712 acres more or less, which is
10		more particularly described in Attachment A – legal description, and as depicted
11		in Attachment B – survey map; and
12	WHEREAS,	the intertie connecting the White Horse Pass Community water system into the
13		Chui-Chu Public Water System will be of substantial benefit to White Horse Pass
14		Community members who will have access to better quality of drinking water by
15		alleviating the contaminants associated with both arsenic and nitrate that
16		exceed the EPA Maximum Contaminant Levels, as well as an upgrade to the water
17		distribution line; and
18	WHEREAS,	IHS consulted with both the Nation's Tribal Historic Preservation Office and the
19		Wildlife and Vegetation Management Program and has received clearances from
20		both respective programs, attached as Attachments C and D respectively; and
21	WHEREAS,	IHS received floodplain consultation from the Nation's Water Resources
22		Department (the "Department") advising that a foundation pad be constructed
23		for the proposed booster pumping station site to mitigate the effects of a potential
24		100-year storm event whereby Indian Route 35 would act as a berm causing flood
25		waters to rise three (3) feet before overtopping the road, otherwise no major
26		erosion construction measures were recommended by the Department; and
27	WHEREAS,	the Sif Oidak District Council by Resolution No. SODC 20-038, attached as
28		Attachment E, approved Indian Health Service Project No. TU 20-861, and any
29		necessary encroachment permits; and
30	WHEREAS,	the Agricultural and Natural Resources and Commerce Committees have
31		reviewed the proposed utility alignment and recommend granting a right for a
32		utility alignment for the Project.
33	NOW, THERI	EFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council grants to
34		TOUA a right to a utility alignment for Project TU 20-861– Chui-Chu to White Horse

Pass Communities Water System Intertie and directs the Nation's Real Estate Management Office to provide a copy of this executed resolution and the legal description for the utility alignment to the BIA for their records. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council grants approval of any encroachment permits for the Project, including future individual services installed on the system, which may be granted by the BIA pursuant to federal regulations to allow the utility alignment or service lines to individual customers to cross roads constructed by the BIA.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the Nation's chairperson, or his designee, is authorized to execute

any documents reasonably necessary to implement this resolution.

The foregoing Resolution was passed by the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council on the 10TH day of <u>AUGUST</u>, 2021 at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of 3,218.0 FOR; -0-AGAINST; -0- NOT VOTING; and [02] ABSENT, pursuant to the powers vested in the Council by Article VI, Section 1(i)(2) and 2(d) of the Constitution of the Tohono O'odham Nation, adopted by the Tohono O'odham Nation on January 18, 1986; and approved by the Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary - Indian Affairs (Operations) on March 6, 1986, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat.984).
