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. 1	WHEREAS,	The Papago Tribe has consistently recognized that good health and well-being of its population is a major objective to be achieved; and
2		The Papago Tribe has provided programs to achieve this end through
3		funding for a nutrition program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC)
4		authorized by Congress through the "Child Nutrition Amendments of
		1978", P.L. 95-627 and made available through the US Department of
5	1	Agriculture (USDA); and
6	WHEREAS,	State Agencies receive such funds for the purpose of administering
7		a WIC program from the Secretary of Agriculture; and
8	WHEREAS,	The Papago Tribe is presently providing WIC services to its eligible clients through contracts with the Arizona State Bureau of Nutrition
9		Services; and
10	WHEREAS.	There are a number of disadvantages to the State administered WIC
	2	program such as state control of tribal program operations, state
11		priorities and program evaluations that often differ from tribal
12		policies and needs, and state policies that are more restrictive

	WHEREAS,	Tribal WIC program directors and nutritionists have studied alterna-
17		tives to present WIC contracting arrangements; and
18	WHEREAS,	An Inter-Tribal State level WIC administrative agency would result
19		in more effective and efficient WIC services in several key areas
20		including the following:
21		more direct funding to tribes more involvement in planning and implementation of tribal health
22		goals through technical assistance, training, policy development
		and program evaluations oriented toward tribal needs;
23		tribal control over policy development and development and
24		implementation of less restrictive regulations in line with
25		current federal regulations;
26		consistency of funding levels and possible increases in future years based on realistic projected needs;
27		tribal information would be able to be used as a data base for
28		long range health services planning with Indian Health Service.

	ratified by the Papago Tribe on December 12, 1936, and approved by the Secretary							
26	18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984). Said Resolution is not subject to review by the							
27	Secretary of the Interior and is effective as of the date of its enactment by the Papago Council.
