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26	WHEREAS,	sovereignty of tribes is important to maintain and reinforce. The
27		relationship of Indian Tribes with the federal and state
28		governments is that of government-to-government. Tribes as

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2 sovereign nations determine its members and have other rights by 3 virtue of their status as a sovereign nations. If a tribe wishes to 4 5 set its criteria for membership at 100% blood quantum, 50%, 25% 6 or on descendence; then it's their choice, their determination; and 7 WHEREAS, in the allocation of funds for the benefit of Indians because of 8 9 their status as Indians, the federal government must use 10 population and other factors to determine the level of allocation 11 for each area, service unit and, indirectly, for each tribe; and 12 13 WHEREAS, notwithstanding the fact that tribes have determined their 14 members, by some criteria, we propose that for resource 15 distribution that it be based on an "equitable/equality" formula. 16 17 A distribution of resources that is not only equitable but equal. 18 With the equality factor to be based on blood quantum. A blood 19 quantum of one-quarter Indian blood; and 20 21 WHEREAS, equal distribution of funds to Indians would be determined by 22 defining an Indian as one with one-quarter blood quantum. 23 Based on the rolls of the tribe, those Indians with less than one-24 25 quarter blood quantum would be grouped to equal one-quarter, 26 equalling one Indian. Thus if there are two Indians at one-eighth 27 blood quantum, these two put together would equal one Indian; 28

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2 for resource distribution purposes. Therefore, the funds would be 3 distributed to Indians of at least one-quarter blood quantum; and 4 5 WHEREAS, this proposal does not affect the sovereign right of a tribe to 6 determine its members, it only addresses the distribution of funds 7 to Indians. And that Indians, in this case would be defined as 8 9 Indians of one-quarter blood quantum. With limited resources, 10 this proposal defines who the dollars are serving, the 11 beneficiaries; and 12 13 WHEREAS, there will continue to be a need to address the people who have 14 traditionally fallen into the local definition and acceptance of an 15 individual as an Indian. One who has adopted to the way of life 16 17 and language of the tribe but may have little Indian blood 18 quantum to be classified as an eligible person based on the 19 proposed formula. But hopefully, they would be served by the 20 21 local tribe and service unit based on the heritage he possesses; and 22 WHEREAS, critics, both Indian and non-Indian, seek a resolution to this 23 problem. There is no easy answer to this question. The goal of 24 25 our proposal is simply suggest a possible solution to the problem. 26 An attempt to define a group of beneficiaries that justifies the 27 existence of agencies who serve the Indians; Indian Health Service 28

4	WHEREAS, in years to come the Indian may disappear because of							
5								
6	miscegenation, but the programs established to serve the Indians							
7	will also disappear. Other factors such as a national health							
8	insurance plan may solve this problem for us, in the mean time,							
9	we need to address and come to some consensus of an equitable							
10								
11	but equal distribution of funds.							
12	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Nation							
13	submits the "equitable but equal" formula as a possible solution							
14	to address the distribution of health funds to Indian beneficiaries.							
15								
16	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Nation requests the							
17	support of all Indian Nations at the 49th Annual Convention of							
18	the National Congress of American Indians on the "equitable but							
19								
20	equal" formula.
