8		stray livestock, participating in spiritual practices, and for the sake of

11	WHEREAS,	since the imposition of the U.SMexico border, in 1853, approximately		
12		75 miles of the Tohono O'odham Nation and two of our districts (Gu Vo,		
13		Chukut Kuk) now stand adjacent to the border; and		
14	WHEREAS,	the Nation recognizes that the Gadsden Purchase of 1853, Article IX of		
15		the treaty, requires that "[those] whoshall not preserve the character		
16		of citizens of the Mexican Republicshall be maintained and		
17		protected in the free enjoyment of their liberty and property, and		
18		secured in the free exercise of their religion without restriction;" and		
19	WHEREAS,	in spite of this imposition of the U.SMexico border, many of our		
20		people continue to cross the border regularly; and		
21	WHEREAS.	recent federal government enforcement activities along the southern		
22		international border have placed enormous hardships for all Tohono		
23		O'odham; and		
24	WHEREAS	enforcement of the U.S. Immigration laws has made it extremely

6	WHEREAS, the Nation is fully aware of other tribes similarly situated who have					
7	received a clarification of existing treaty rights to freely pass and re-					
8	pass the international boundary; and					
9	WHEREAS, Tohono O'odham have repeatedly presented this issue to Congress					
10	since the time of the Gadsden Purchase.					
11	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Tohono O'odham Nation Legislative					
12	Council hereby empower the Chairman of the Nation to seek federal					
13	recognition of our O'odham residing in Mexico and a clarification of					
14	our historical and indigenous right to freely pass and re-pass the					
15	international boundary existing between the United States and the					
16	Republic of Mexico.					
17	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Chairman of the Nation and the					
18	Legislative Council Appropriations Committee represent the interests					
19	of our O'odham residing in Mexico before the United States Congress					
20	and work towards the introduction of appropriate legislation that will					
21	provide federal recognition of our O'odham residing in Mexico.
