1	WHEREAS, Fairfield Canoa Ranch L.L.C. represented by Frank Thompson/The Planning

8	WHEREAS, a proposal has been submitted to amend the Pima County Major Streets and

1	150 feet; realigning the Camino de la Canoa major route alignment as a scenic
2	major route with a planned right-of-way of up to 150 feet to follow the Canoa
3	Road alignment along the east boundary of the San Ignacio de La Canoa Land
4	Grant to Elephant Head Road; and, extending Canoa Ranch Road and Elephant
5	Head Road as major scenic routes with planned rights-of-way of up to 150 feet to
6	the new Camino de la Canoa alignment; and
7	WHEREAS, the O'odham have lived upon and used these lands located within the San
8	Ignacio de la Canoa Land Grant along the Santa Cruz River, from time
9	immemorial, from days beyond history's records, far past any living memory,
0.	deep into the time of stories and legends and regard these lands as part of their
1	sacred traditional home; and
2	WHEREAS, the O'odham regard the peoples of the Paleo Indian, Archaic and Hohokam

WHEREAS, the United States Indian Claims Commission in 1968, recognized these lands in
the Santa Cruz Valley as being traditional-use lands of the O'odham; and
WHEREAS, the cultural resources located in this area also have importance and significance
to the Gila River Indian Community, the Ak Chin Indian Community, the Sal
River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community, the Hopi Nation, the Zuni Nation and
the Apache Nations; and
WHEREAS, the National Historic Preservation act of 1966, as amended, 16 U.S.C. 470 et seq.
requires that federal agency preservation activities be carried out in consultation
with State and local agencies, with Native American tribes, and with the private
sector, and may be applicable to this case because of the action of the U.S. Army
Corps of Engineers in issuing a Clean Water Act Section 404 permit; and
WHEREAS, the American Indian Religious Freedom Act of 1978, 42 U.S.C. 1996, recognizes
the rights of all Native Americans, Native Hawaiians, Eskimos and Aleuts to
practice their traditional religions and protect and preserve their sacred
ceremonial sites; and
WHEREAS, the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act of 1990, 25 U.S.C
3001 et seq., recognizes the rights of all Native American tribes to protect and

cultural patrimony; and

WHEREAS, the Arizona Burial Discovery Act, Arizona Revised Statutes, Section 41-865,
requires developers of private land to consult with Native American tribes

threatened, and sensitive species including the black-capped gnatcatcher, brown

14	1. Opposes the request of Fairfield Canoa Ranch L.L.C., represented by Frank
15	Thompson/The Planning Center to rezone approximately 5,240 acres from RH
16	(Rural Homestead) to SP (Specific Plans) located within the La Canoa Land
17	Grant on both sides of the Santa Cruz River and Interstate 19 (Co23-97-02,
18	CANOA RANCH SPECIFIC PLAN) and strongly urges the Pima County
19	Supervisors to reject this rezoning request.
20	2. Opposes the proposal to amend the Pima County Major Streets and Scenic
21	Routes Plan by adding a southward major route extension of Camino del Sol
22	through the Canoa Ranch Specific Plan and strongly urges the Pima County
23	Supervisors to reject this road expansion proposal.

- 4. Reiterates the strenuous opposition of the Tohono O'odham Nation to the continuing destruction by development projects such as Canoa Ranch of its traditional-use lands with their significant cultural resource sites and traditional cultural places that are infused with special traditional, ceremonial, sacred and other cultural meanings that span the past and present. The spiritual geography of the O'odham that spans time and space and contains a deep respect for historical, cultural and environmental values should be respected.

The foregoing Resolution was passed by the Tohono O'odham Council on the <u>06TH</u>. day of <u>JANUARY</u>, 1999 at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of <u>1,927.0</u> FOR; <u>-0-AGAINST</u>; <u>-0-NOT VOTING</u>; and [1] ABSENT, pursuant to the powers vested in the Council by Section <u>1(c)(8)</u> of Article VI of the Constitution of the Tohono O'Odham Nation, adopted by the Tohono O'Odham Nation on January 18, 1986; and approved by the Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary - Indian Affairs (Operations) on March 6, 1986, pursuant to Section 16 of

the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
