(Accepting U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Invitation to Consult on Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Concerning the Navajo Generating Station and Impacts on the Nation's Water Resources)

1	WHEREAS,	sovereign Indian tribes share a unique trust relationship with the United States of
2		America, which is embodied in the Constitution of the United States, numerous court
3	:	opinions, statutes, executive orders, and federal agency policies; and
4	WHEREAS,	the United States Congress has recognized the federal government's "trust
5		responsibilities to protect Indian water rights" and the United States Department of
6		the Interior has expressly acknowledged its trust responsibility concerning tribal
7		water resources (Western Water Policy Review Act of 1992, Pub. L. 102-575, title XXX,
8		§ 3002(9), reprinted at 43 U.S.C. § 371; 55 Fed. Reg. 9223 (1990)); and
9	WHEREAS,	the Bureau of Reclamation within the Department of the Interior has likewise
10		acknowledged its role as a trustee for tribal water resources and has pledged to
11		protect tribal assets (Indian Policy of the Bureau of Reclamation, February 25, 1998);
12		and
13	WHEREAS,	after many years of negotiations with federal, state, and private parties, the Tohono
14		O'odham Nation agreed to settle substantial water rights and other claims in
15		$accordance \ with \ the \ terms \ of Pub.\ L.\ 108-451, the \ Arizona\ Water Settlements\ Act, Title$
16		III, the Southern Arizona Water Rights Settlement Act Amendments ("SAWRSA
17		Amendments"); and

21	WHEREAS,	the SAWRSA Amendments require that the United States "pay to the Central Arizona
22		${\bf Projectoperatingagencythefixedoperation,maintenance,andreplacementcharges}$
23		associated with the delivery of the Nation's Central Arizona Project water" from the
24		Lower Colorado River Basin Development Fund (SAWRSA Amendments, Section
25		309(g)(6) and Section 107(a)(2)(A)); and
26	WHEREAS,	the United States is also obligated to pay the variable operating costs, including the
27		cost of electricity to run the pumps which operate the Central Arizona Project, from
28		the Cooperative Fund originally established and funded by the Southern Arizona
29		Water Rights Settlement Act of 1982 and reauthorized by Section 310 of the SAWRSA
30		Amendments (SAWRSA Amendments, Section 310 (b)(1)(A)); and

1	WHEREAS,	the United States Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA") has published an Advanced
2		Notice of Proposed Rulemaking ("ANPR") concerning proposed air pollution controls
3		for Navajo Generating Station ("NGS") (74 Fed. Reg. 44313; August 28, 2009 ("NGS
4	ļ	Rulemaking")); and
5	WHEREAS,	the NGS is a coal-fired power plant on the Navajo Nation that generates electricity to
6		pump CAP water, and revenues derived from excess NGS power sales support the
7		Lower Colorado River Basin Development Fund, which pays for the fixed operation,
8		maintenance, and replacement costs associated with deliveries of the Nation's CAP
9		entitlement; and
10	WHEREAS,	the NGS and associated coal mining operations provide substantial revenues to the
11		Navajo Nation and Hopi Tribe, and provide jobs to tribal members; and
12	WHEREAS,	on November 25, 2009 the Office of the Governor of Arizona coordinated a meeting
13	;	between certain Arizona tribes and Bureau of Reclamation, the Salt River Project, the
14		Central Arizona Water Conservation District, and other water and power interests in
15	;	the State of Arizona to discuss the NGS Rulemaking; and
16	WHEREAS,	several entities who made presentations at the November 25, 2009 stakeholders
17		meeting argued that the proposed pollution controls for NGS will negatively affect
18		Arizona Indian tribes in a number of ways, including by dramatically increasing the
19		cost of delivering CAP water and reducing revenues to the Lower Colorado River Basin
20		Development Fund; and
21	WHEREAS,	the cost and availability of electricity from NGS will impact the variable power costs
22		associated with the delivery of the Nation's CAP entitlement and therefore also impact
23		the SAWRSA Cooperative Fund; and
24	WHEREAS,	the EPA, Navajo Nation, and Hopi Tribe were not invited to the stakeholders meeting
25		and meeting participants had not previously consulted with the Nation regarding the
26		NGS Rulemaking; and
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RESOLUTION NO. <u>09</u>-644 (Accepting U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Invitation to Consult on Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Concerning the Navajo Generating Station and Impacts on the Nation's Water Resources) Page 3 of 5 WHEREAS, federal departments and agencies are mandated by Executive Order 13175, 1 2 "Consultation and Coordination with Indian Tribal Governments" ("Consultation 3 Order") to consult with tribes when formulating and implementing policies or taking other actions that have a substantial direct effect on any Indian tribe (Executive Order 4 5 13175 (November 6, 2000)); and 6 WHEREAS, the Consultation Order and additional executive orders and memoranda require that 7 all Executive Branch agencies ensure that there is "meaningful" and "timely" tribal 8 input when formulating or implementing policies that have tribal implications; and 9 WHEREAS, President Obama recently reaffirmed the federal government's commitment "to 10 regular and meaningful consultation and collaboration with tribal officials in policy 11 decisions that have tribal implications including, as an initial step, through complete and consistent implementation of Executive Order 13175" (74 Fed. Reg. 57881 (Nov. 5, 12 13 2009) ("Tribal Consultation Memorandum")); and WHEREAS, EPA Region 9 has adopted an "Approach to Consultation with Tribal Governments 14 15 Regarding Non-Enforcement Related Matters," which describes consultation "as 16 including a meaningful and timely government-to-government dialogue with elected 17 or duly-appointed officials of tribal governments or authorized intertribal 18 organizations"; and WHEREAS, the Inter Tribal Council of Arizona, by Resolution 0709, has urged the EPA to extend the 19 20 period for tribes to comment on the NGS Rulemaking and has also called upon EPA 21 Region 9 to consult with Arizona Indian tribes, the Bureau of Land Management, 22 Bureau of Indian Affairs, and Bureau of Reclamation; and 23 WHEREAS, in a November 13, 2009 letter the EPA Region 9 Acting Administrator invited the 24 Tohono O'odham Nation to consult and to comment on the NGS Rulemaking and extended the period for submission of tribal comments to December 28, 2009, only six 25 26 weeks after the consultation letter was sent to the Nation and other affected tribes; 27 and

1	WHEREAS, the Navajo Generating Station ANPR will have a substantial direct effect on the Nation
2	and other Arizona Indian tribes and, in accordance with the federal government's
3	trust obligation to tribes, the Consultation Order, the Tribal Consultation
4	Memorandum, and EPA policies, all affected tribes are entitled to a meaningful and
5	timely opportunity to consult on the Navajo Generating Station ANPR; and
6	WHEREAS, because the Navajo Generating Station ANPR raises highly complex environmental
7	technological, economic, and policy issues that will require extensive analysis, the
8	Nation will need additional time beyond the December 28, 2009 deadline to consul
9	with the EPA in a meaningful and timely way and to submit its resulting comments.
10	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council hereby
11	(1) designates the Nation's Chairperson and Legislative Water Resources
12	Committee as the officials vested with authority to consult with and submit
13	written comments to the EPA concerning Navajo Generating Station ANPR; and
14	(2) urges the EPA to extend the tribal comment deadline on the Navajo Generating
15	Station ANPR to March 1, 2010 in order to provide the Nation and other affected
16	tribes with a "meaningful" and "timely" opportunity to consult on the Navajo
17	Generating Station ANPR.
18	The foregoing Resolution was passed by the Tohono O'odham Legislative Council on the <u>10TH.</u> Day
19	of <u>DECEMBER, 2009</u> at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of <u>2,408.40</u> FOR; <u>-0</u> -
20	AGAINST; <u>01</u> NOT VOTING; and <u>187.10[02]</u> ABSENT, pursuant to the powers vested in the Council by
21	Article VI, Section 1 (j) of the Constitution of the Tohono O'Odham Nation, adopted by the Tohono
22	O'Odham Nation on January 18, 1986; and approved by the Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary -
23	Indian Affairs (Operations) on March 6, 1986, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48
24	Stat. 984).
