RESOLUTION
OF THE
PAPAGO COUNCIL

RES. NO. 1312

WHEREAS, by virtue of Tribal Resolution No. 1080, the Papago Tribal Council did, on October 23, 1959, recommend to the Bureau of Indian Affairs that Cipriano J. Manuel be appointed Chief Judge of the Papago Tribal Court, to serve 5 days a week, with his salary to be paid in part by the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the balance thereof to be paid by the Papago Tribe, and

WHEREAS, Chapter 1, Section 2, of the Papago Tribal Law and Order Code provides, in part, that each judge shall hold office for a period of two years, but shall be eligible for re-appointment, and it is now more than two years since Judge Manuel was appointed in 1959, and

WHEREAS, Judge Manuel since his appointment as Chief Judge in 1959 has served in this capacity in a highly competent manner and has departed himself, both in and out of Court, in a commendable and trustworthy manner, and

WHEREAS, the Papago Council is of the opinion that Judge Manuel has so performed his judicial duties in the Tribal Court that he deserves re-appointment to his present position, and

WHEREAS, the Papago Council has duly and thoroughly considered the matter of this re-appointment.


NOW, THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED, by the Papago Tribal Council that it recommends to the Bureau of Indian Affairs that Judge Cipriano J. Manuel be re-appointed Chief Judge of the Papago Tribal Court, to serve 5 days a week, at his present annual salary of \$7,800.00, of which amount the Bureau of Indian Affairs now contributes the sum of \$2,080.00, and the Papago Tribe contributes the balance of \$5,720.00, the said appointment to be effective for a period of two years.

The foregoing Resolution was duly enacted by the Papago Council on June 7, 1963, with a vote of 19 for, 0 against, and 1 not voting, at a meeting at which a quorum was present, pursuant to authority vested in the Council by Section 3 (a), Section 3 (b), and Section 3 (f) of Article V of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Papago Tribe ratified by the Tribe on December 12, 1936, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on January 6, 1937, (Stat. 984), pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934. Said Resolution is effective as of the date of its approval by the Superintendent of the Papago Agency and is subject to rescission by the Secretary of the Interior, pursuant to Section 6 of Article V of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Papago Tribe.
