

RESOLUTION
OF THE
PAPAGO COUNCIL

RES. NO. 1324

WHEREAS, the Arizona State Legislature has recently passed a law, demanding the inspection of motor vehicles at least once a year by the State of Arizona, and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the law was to promote safety on the streets and highways of the State, and

WHEREAS, the Papago Council is of the opinion that it would be in the best interest of the safety of motor vehicle traffic and movement on the Papago Reservation if the Papago Council should adopt similar requirements to those of the State regarding motor vehicles in operation on the Reservation, and

WHEREAS, the Papago Council is further of the opinion that the fine of \$300.00 imposed by the State for violation or infraction of these requirements concerning said inspection is excessive insofar as vehicles of the Reservation are concerned, and that a fine of \$100.00 would be more in keeping for Reservation traffic movement.

NOW, THEREFORE LET IT BE RESOLVED, that the law recently passed by the Arizona State Legislature, demanding the inspection of motor vehicles at least once a year by the State of Arizona, shall have full force and effect on the Papago Indian Reservation.


LET IT BE FURTHER RESOLVED, that violations and infractions of these legal requirements concerning inspection shall be the same as those now in force in the State of Arizona, except that the maximum cash fine for such violation or violations shall not exceed \$100.00.

LET IT BE STILL FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Papago Tribal Law and Order Department and the Papago Tribal Court shall have the responsibility and the authority to enforce such regulations and requirements.

The foregoing Resolution was duly enacted by the Papago Council on July 12, 1963, with a vote of 17 for, 0 against, and 5 not voting, at a meeting at which a quorum was present, pursuant to authority vested in the Council by Section 2 (h), Section 2 (m), Section 3 (b), and Section 3 (i) of Article V of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Papago Tribe ratified by the Tribe on December 12, 1936, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on January 6, 1937, (Stat. 984), pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934. Said Resolution is effective as of the date of its approval by the Superintendent of the Papago Agency and is subject to rescission by the Secretary of the Interior, pursuant to Section 6 of Article V of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Papago Tribe.
