## RESOLUTION OF THE PAPAGO COUNCIL

Resolution Number 22 - 73

WHEREAS, The Papago Law and Order Department is understaffed and does not have a permanent cook to prepare proper nutritional meals for the prisoners, a matron to care for female prisoners, jailors for male prisoners and police officers to patrol the reservation, and

WHEREAS, The Papago Tribe and the Bureau of Indian Affairs does not and will not have sufficient funds for additional personnel, and

WHEREAS, The Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, through the Arizona State Justice Planning Agency has funds available for law enforcement assistance,

THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Papago Council that the <del>Triba</del>l Chairman be authorized to apply to the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, through the Arizona State Justice Planning Agency for funds to provide additional personnel for better services to the Papago people.

The foregoing resolution was duly enacted by the Papago Council on 12 - 7 - 73, at a meeting of which a quorum was present by a vote of 22 for and O against, O absent, pursuant to the authority vested in the Council by Section 2(A) Article V of the Constitution and By-laws of the Papago Tribe as amended, ratified by the Papago Tribe on December 12, 1936 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on January 6, 1937 (Stat. 984), pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934.
