## RESOLUTION OF THE PAPAGO TRIBE

RES. NO. 23-74

WHEREAS, there are located on Papago lands many archeological and historical resources which contain information important to understanding the past of the Papago people, and

WHEREAS, many of these resources are not recorded or identified, and

WHEREAS, the Papago wish to preserve this portion of their heritage where possible, but at the same time the Papago wish to continue the orderly but essential development of all their resources, and

WHEREAS, there are various legislative and administrative requirements for the conservation of archeological and historic resources that are applicable to all Federal land development programs, and

WHEREAS, the National Park Service with the support of the Bureau of Indian Affairs has developed and proposed an archeological conservation program that would assist trival and government planners and decisionmakers in meeting these requirements, and

WHEREAS, such a program would provide long term employment and training for local residents and would secondly, conserve and record archeological and historical resources, and finally would aid in the timely development of other resources.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Papago Council gives its full support to such an endeavor because of the urgent and continuing need for essential development of Papago lands.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that by this resolution the Papago Council endorses the concept of the Archeological Convervation Team proposal and the need to make archeological examinations of lands proposed for development because of legislative and administrative requirements implemented by various departments.

FINALLY LET IT BE RESOLVED, that the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, or their desquee be directed to seek approval of Apadematly desquee and sign all relevant documents.

The foregoing Resolution was duly enacted by the Papago Council on the 25th day of June, 1974, at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of 8 for, 7 against, 5 not voting, and passed, pursuant to the authority vested in the Papago Council of the Papago Tribe, ratified by the Tribe on December 12, 1936, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on January 6, 1937 (48 Stat. 984), pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934. Said Resolution is effective as of the date of its approval by the Superintendent of the Papago Agency and is subject to review by the Secretary of the Interior.
