## RESOLUTION OF THE PAPAGO COUNCIL (Transfer of Topawa Community Building to Buboquivari District)

RES. NO. 82-75

WHEREAS, the Papago Tribe is interested in the advancement of activities and the improvement of life for the Papago people in the villages and in the districts; and WHEREAS, in 1966 an application was filed with the Economic Development Administration for financial assistance to build multi-purpose structures to 5 be used as "community" buildings in five districts; and 6 WHEREAS, in 1967 the Economic Development Administration provided the Papago 7 Tribe with a grant of \$164,000 to be matched by a \$41,000 contribution 8 from the Papago Tribe for the construction of these community build-40 ings; and 11 WHEREAS, the construction of the Baboquivari District Community Building at 12 Topawa was completed by the Papago Construction Company and accepted 13 from the EDA by the Papago Council by Resolution No. 26-75 on May 2, 14 1975. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the community building at Topawa be offi-15 16 cially transferred to the control and management of the Baboquivari 17 District Council for the express purpose of advancing the District's 18 goals for education, culture, community development and economic 19 improvement; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Tribal Chairman be authorized to present the 21 keys to the building, all mechanical instruction manuals and parts 22 catalogs, and equipment warranties and graranties to the Chairman of 23 the Baboquivari District; and 24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon this transfer, all the rights to occupancy and 25 responsibilities for building upkeep, maintenance, repair, and the 26 payment of all utility costs be assumed by the Baboquivari District. The foregoing Resolution was duly enacted by the Papago Council on October 27 28 , 1975, at a meeting of which a quorum was present by a vote of 834.0 29 against, 0 not voting; and 0 absent, pursuant to 30 authority vested in the Council by Section 2 (d) Article V of the Constitution 31 and By-laws of the Papago Tribe, as amended, ratified by the Interior on 32 December 12, 1936 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on January 6,
