RESOLUTION OF THE PAPAGO COUNCIL

(Remedial Legislation Regarding Federal Medical and Social Services Legislation)

RES. NO. 89-75

1 WHEREAS, the Federal Government has, under recently passed medical and social
2 ~~services legislation, designated the various States and their political~~
3 subdivisions and agencies as the sole planning, administrative and
4 funding authorities for federally funded medical and social services
5 within the geographic boundaries of the various States; and
6 WHEREAS, said legislation, including Title XX of the Social Securities Act
7 (P.L. 93-647), The National Health Planning and Resources Development
8 Act (P.L. 93-64), and the Integrated Grant Administration Programs
9 was developed and passed without regard to the special treaty, legal
10 and/or trust relationships existing between the Federal Government and
11 Indian Tribes; without regard to the unique geographic, demographic,
12 social and economic conditions existing on Indian Reservations; and in
13 derogation of the sovereign independence of Indian Tribes from State
14 control recently recognized and mandated by Congress in the Indian Self-
15 Determination Act (P.L. 93-638); and
16 WHEREAS, said legislation, and any other Federal programs which, under the guise
17 of "New Federalism", propose to give the States and their political
18 subdivisions and agencies authority to plan federally mandated services,
19 and to administer and allocate Federal funds for such services, will
20 give the States the power to usurp and interfere with the sovereign
21 power of Indian Tribes to govern themselves; will permit the States
22 and their agencies to minimize Indian participation by setting stand-
23 ards, selecting data and designating agencies and contract providers
24 which will favor the States and their political sub-divisions and
25 agencies; and
26 WHEREAS, in order for Indian people to participate as consumers in such feder-
27 ally funded service programs in the proportion, and in accordance with
28 the priorities and purposes expressed in the Federal laws appropriating
29 funds for such programs, it will be necessary to obtain remedial Fed-
30 eral legislation which will allocate funds for such service programs
31 for Indian consumers directly to Indian Tribes.

1 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Papago Council that the Papago Tribe be-
2 lieves it to be essential that Congress develop and pass remedial
3 legislation which will allocate directly to Indian Tribes the funds
4 appropriated by Congress for medical and social services intended for
5 Indian Reservations and consumers, in the proportion, and in accordance
6 with the priorities and purposes expressed in the Federal laws appro-
7 priating the funds for such services; and
8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Papago Tribe seek the interest and support of
9 other Indian Tribes and organizations in asking Congress for such
10 remedial legislation.
11 The foregoing Resolution was duly enacted by the Papago Council on the 7th day
12 of November, 1975, at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of
13 834.0 for; 0 against; 0 not voting; and 1 absent, pursuant
14 to authority vested in the Papago Council by Section 2 (a), (d) and (h) of Art-
15 icle V of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Papago Tribe of Arizona ratified
16 by the Tribe on December 12, 1936, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior
17 on January 6, 1937 (48 Stat: 984), pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18,
18 1934. Said Resolution is effective as of the date of its approval by the
19 Superintendent of the Papago Agency and is not subject to review by the Secretary
20 of the Interior.
