

RESOLUTION OF THE PAPAGO COUNCIL

RES. NO. 40-77

1 WHEREAS, the community of Ajo, Arizona has a large minority population, including
2 over 120 Indian families; and

3 WHEREAS, such Indian population of Ajo is in serious need of social services, such
4 as day care, legal aid and medical centers, employment programs, trans-
5 portation for the handicapped and needy, adult education, senior citizens
6 programs, and alcoholism programs; and

7 WHEREAS, such social services can best be provided to the Indian population of
8 Ajo by the establishment of an Ajo Indian Center; and

9 WHEREAS, the Johnson-O'Malley Indian Committee of the Ajo-Curley School did, at a
10 meeting on March 15, 1977, offer to spearhead the establishment of such
11 an Indian Center.

12 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Papago Council that it finds that the
13 Indian population of Ajo is in serious need of social services, including
14 a day care, legal aid and medical center, employment programs directed
15 particularly to young adults, transportation of the handicapped and needy,
16 adult education and senior citizens and alcoholism programs; and that
17 such social services can be provided to the Indian population of Ajo by
18 the establishment of an Ajo Indian Center.

19 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Papago Council recommends and endorses the estab-
20 lishment of an Indian Center in Ajo, and commends the Johnson-O'Malley
21 Committee of the Ajo-Curley School in spearheading the establishment of
22 such a Center.

23 The foregoing Resolution was duly enacted by the Papago Council on the 26th day
24 of May, 1977, at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of 834.0 for
25 0 against; 0 not voting; and 4 absent, pursuant to the authority
26 vested in the Council by Section 2 (a) of Article V of the Constitution and By-laws
27 of the Papago Tribe as amended, ratified by the Papago Tribe on December 12, 1936,
28 and approved by the Secretary of Interior on January 6, 1937, pursuant to Section
29 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984). Said Resolution is not subject to
30 review by the Secretary of Interior and is effective as of the date of its enact-
31 ment by the Papago Council.
