

RESOLUTION OF THE PAPAGO TRIBAL COUNCIL

Res. No. 88-77

1 WHEREAS, the Papago Tribe is seriously attempting to develop its
2 abundant sources of underground water throughout the
3 Reservation in order to support its agrarian economy, and
4 WHEREAS, the U.S. Congress after numerous Tribal requests
5 for funding has appropriated \$3.2 million to fund
6 Phase One of the PAPAGO FARMS AGRICULTURAL DEVEL-
7 OPMENT PROJECT which will ultimately consist of 25,000
8 acres of irrigated Tribal land located near the Mexican
9 border in Chukut Kuk District, and

10 WHEREAS, the greatest benefits of this development project will be
11 (1) a Tribally-owned agricultural program capable of
12 self-sufficiency, (2) continuous employment for a large
13 Papago work force at good wages and salaries, and
14 (3) quantity production of livestock feed at affordable
15 prices to maximize Papago livestock income throughout
16 the year.

17 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Papago Tribe prepare
18 and submit an application to the Bureau of Indian Affairs
19 Phoenix Area Office for funding this project under the
20 Tribal grant contracting provisions of P.L. 93-638
21 (Indian Self-Determination Act of January 1975).

22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chairman be authorized to take
23 any and all actions necessary to insure that grant funds
24 are disbursed properly, that an accurate bookkeeping
25 system be maintained for the project, that the project
26 be competently staffed, that an efficient plan of operation
27 be devised and closely followed, and the project (PHASE
28 ONE) be successfully completed in consonance with Tribal
29 goals and objectives.

30 The foregoing Resolution was duly enacted by the Papago Council
31 on the 26th day of October, 1977, at a meeting at which a
32 quorum was present with a vote of 1011.0 for; 0 against;


