abundant sources of underground water throughout the
Reservation in order to support its agrarian economy, and
WHEREAS, the U.S. Congress after numerous Tribal requests

- WHEREAS, the U.S. Congress . . . after numerous Tribal requests for funding . . . has appropriated \$3.2 million to fund Phase One of the PAPAGO FARMS AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECT which will ultimately consist of 25,000 acres of irrigated Tribal land located near the Mexican border in Chukut Kuk District, and
- WHEREAS, the greatest benefits of this development project will be

  (1) a Tribally-owned agricultural program capable of
  self-sufficiency, (2) continuous employment for a large
  Papago work force at good wages and salaries, and

  (3) quantity production of livestock feed at affordable
  prices to maximize Papago livestock income throughout
  the year.
- NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Papago Tribe prepare and submit an application to the Bureau of Indian Affairs Phoenix Area Office for funding this project under the Tribal grant contracting provisions of P.L. 93-638 (Indian Self-Determination Act of January 1975).
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chairman be authorized to take any and all actions necessary to insure that grant funds are disbursed properly, that an accurate bookkeeping system be maintained for the project, that the project be competently staffed, that an efficient plan of operation be devised and closely followed, and the project (PHASE ONE) be successfully completed in consonance with Tribal goals and objectives.

The foregoing Resolution was duly enacted by the Papago Council on the <u>26th</u> day of <u>October</u>, 1977, at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of <u>1011.0</u> for; <u>0</u> against;
