RESOLUTION OF THE PAPAGO TRIBAL COUNCIL Early Childhood Education - FY 1984

RES. NO. <u>14-83</u>

WHEREAS, the Papago Tribe has continuously endorsed the importance of 1 Early Childhood learning by prioritizing its early childhood 2 education programs; and 3 WHEREAS, the Papago Tribe has been continually frustrated by the lack of an adequate and secure funding source for operation of its 4 early childhood education program; and  $\mathbf{5}$ WHEREAS, the Papago Tribe believes that the Bureau of Indian Affairs 6 has a legal mandate and obligation to provide for quality 7 education beginning with early childhood through life pursuant to the Indian Education Amendments of 1978 and its final 8 regulations; and 9 WHEREAS, Congress has directed the Bureau of Indian Affairs to establish 10a formula for funding and to aggressively seek adequate appropriations from Congress for early childhood education programs, 11 which the Bureau has failed to carry out; and 12 WHEREAS, the Bureau of Indian Affairs has consistently indicated its 13 position of non-commitment to the continuation of early childhood education as evidenced by the fact that in June 1982 new 14 education standards were drafted which eliminated pre-kinder-15 garten provisions entirely; and 16 WHEREAS, this position is further supported by the decision of the Bureau of Indian Affairs to delete pre-kindergarten programs 17 from its appropriations requests for FY 1984; and 18 WHEREAS, this unilateral decision by the Bureau of Indian Affairs presents 19 not only a real danger of irreparable harm for Papago children, but also constitutes a direct violation of the Bureau's own 20 policy requiring tribal consultation before any educational 21 policy is changed or modified, (see 25 CFR 31.4(a)). NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Papago Tribal Council calls upon 22 the President, Congress, Secretary of the Interior, Assistant 23Secretary for Indian Affairs and other appropriate persons to 24 rectify the omission by the Bureau of Indian Affairs of prekindergarten programs from its FY 84 budget and to reaffirm the **2**5 intent of P.L. 95-561 by reinstating the pre-kindergarten 26requirements in the education standards so that a funding formula 27 can be developed for early childhood programs. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Papago Tribal Council calls upon the 28 President and Congress to reaffirm explicitly and implicitly its 29 federal trust responsibility to Indian education. 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Papago Tribal Council calls upon the Assistant Secretary of Indian Affairs to direct all Bureau 31 personnel to consult with the Papago and all other affected 32

NO. 14-83 Early Childhood Education - FY 1984 1 Tribes before any changes or modifications are proposed reaffirming the intent of the Indian Self-Determination and 2 Education Assistance law. 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chairman and the officers of the Papago 4 Tribal Council, the Education Department and Tribal Attorneys are authorized and directed to carry out the intent of this  $\mathbf{5}$ Resolution. 6 The foregoing Resolution was duly enacted by the Papago Council on the 11th day of February, 1983, at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of 1148.0 for; 0 against; 0 not voting; and 1 absent, pursuant to the authority vested in the Papago Council by Section 2 (d) of 7 8 Article V of the Constitution and By-laws of the Papago Tribe of Arizona as amended, ratified by the Papago Tribe on December 12, 1936, and approved by 9 the Secretary of the Interior on January 6, 1937, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
