RESOLUTION OF THE PAPAGO TRIBAL COUNCIL Impact Aid

1	WHEREAS,	Indian Oasis-Baboquiyari Unified School District No. 40 is the main
2		public school serving the Papago Reservation and large numbers of
3		Papago children attend other public schools in non-Indian communities
		surrounding the Papago reservation; and
4	WHEREAS,	the State of Arizona has imposed a limit on the amount of impact aid
5		the school districts serving Papago children may spend for operations
6		and such limit is determined without regard to the school districts' higher fixed operating costs or the federal Indian self-determination
7		policy as it is expressed in the impact aid program; and
8	WHEREAS,	on March 24, 1983, the State of Arizona received initial permission
		from the U.S. Department of Education to equalize impact aid for the
9		fiscal year ending October 31, 1983, with the result that, unless
10		the Department's decision is reversed on appeal, Arizona will with-
11		hold approximately \$960,000.00 in state assistance which would
12		otherwise be paid to Indian Oasis-Baboquiyari for operating expenses
		this school year and will continue to withhold comparable amounts
13	THEDEVE	in future years; and the decision to allow the State of Arizona to equalize impact aid
14	WHEREAS,	had the dual effect of, first, taking from Indian Oasis-Baboquivari
15		revenue needed to meet its higher fixed operating costs and, second,
16	i.	nullifying the federal Indian self-determination policy as it is
17		expressed in the impact aid program; and
18	WHEREAS,	the effect of Arizona's school district spending limit and the
.		federal decision to allow equalization of impact aid is to deny
19		equal educational opportunity to Papago children and make it

22	WHEREAS -	there have been proposed certain draft amendments to the federal

28	WHEREAS,	entitled "Summary of 3/7/83 Draft Impact Aid Amendments" which is
29		attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference; and
30	WHEREAS,	on March 17, 1983, the Papago Education Committee reviewed the
		proposed impact aid amendments and gave their support for the
31		concepts expressed therein and further requested the assistance of
32		the Papago Education Department, the Papago Tribe, and other

appropriate entities and individuals in securing enactment into law of said concepts; and

WHEREAS, on March 22, 1983, the Board of Trustees of Indian Oasis-Baboquivari Unified School District No. 40 gave its support for the concepts expressed in the proposed impact aid amendments and requested the assistance of the Papago Tribe, other Indian tribes and school districts, the Inter-Tribal Council of Arizona, the National Congress of American Indians, the Center for Law and Education, and other appropriate entities and individuals in securing enactment into law of said concepts; and

WHEREAS, the Civil Rights Division of the United States Department of Justice is currently considering whether it will take measures to address the impact aid problems described here so as to protect the civil rights of Arizona's Indian people and prevent state law from blocking implementation of the federal Indian self-determination policy.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that:

- 1. The Papago Tribal Council endorses the concepts expressed in the proposed impact aid amendments and respectfully requests the U.S. Congress and the President of the United States to amend the law accordingly.
- 2. The Papago Tribal Council authorizes and directs the Papago Education Department, together with the officers, tribal attorneys, lobbyists and other agents of the Papago Tribe, to take whatever actions may be necessary to secure enactment into law of the concepts expressed in the proposed impact aid amendments. Such actions may include but shall not be limited to working with other tribal governments and Indian school districts, the Inter-Tribal Council of Arizona, the National Congress of American Indians, the Center for Law and Education, and other appropriate entities and individuals to develop and execute a plan for the adoption of amendments.
- 3. The Papago Education Department is further authorized to assist in the organizing of an Indian impact aid meeting in the near future to address the impact aid issues described herein and develop an appropriate legislative strategy regarding impact aid amendments.
- 4. The Papago Tribal Council requests the Civil Rights Division of the U.S. Department of Justice to use its resources to oppose by all available means Arizona's spending limit as it applies to impact aid.
- 5. The Papago Education Department is directed to prepare a

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report for review by the Education Committee and the Papago Council 1) describing what steps may be taken to implement the federal Indian self-determination policy as it is expressed in the impact aid program and the effect of such implementation on the overall educational system serving Papago students, and 2) regarding the need for funding a Washington-based lobbyist for impact aid amendments and the feasibility of funding such a lobbyist through contributions by the affected tribes and school districts or through other means.

The foregoing Resolution was duly enacted by the Papago Council on the 11th day of April, 1983, at a meeting at which a quorum was present with a vote of 1060.5 for; 0 against; 87.5 not voting; and 1 absent, pursuant to the authority vested in the Papago Council by Section 2 (a), (d) and (h) of Article V of the Constitution and By-laws of the Papago Tribe of Arizona as amended, ratified by the Papago Tribe on December 12, 1936, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on January 6, 1937, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984). Said Resolution is not subject to review by the Secretary of the Interior and is effective as of its enactment by the Papago Council.
